

ANOTHER JIM CROW CAR CASE.

Arrest of a Negro Traveler Who Per- sisted in Riding With the White People.

On Tuesday evening a negro named Adolph Plossy was arrested by Private Detective Cain on the East Louisiana train and locked up for violating section 2 of act 111 of 1890, relative to separate coaches.

It appears that Plossy purchased a ticket to Covington, and shortly before his arrest the conductor asked him if he was a colored man. On the latter replying that he was the conductor informed him that he would have to go into the car set aside for colored people. This he refused to do, and Mr. Cain then stepped up and requested him to go into the other coach, but he still refused, and Mr. Cain thereupon informed him that he would either have to go or go to jail. He replied that he would sooner go to jail than leave the coach, and was thereupon arrested.

He waived examination yesterday before Recorder Monlin, and was sent before the criminal court under \$500 bonds.
